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GOSPEL SEEDS

Over the past month, our Church Council has met regularly and explored the complicated needs and clear vision of our Community Church. Among us there is a deep and resonant consensus that we are committed to the health and wellbeing of our entire community. We miss our reqular patterns; we even grieve the absence of worship opportunities and community gatherings. But we are steadfast in our shared commitment to practices that protect and cherish public health and community wellness.

For this reason, we are moving especially slowly this summer, and even into the fall. We're looking at guidance from the Centers for Disease Control, the Strafford County Public Health Network and our own United Church of Christ. On all fronts, we're counseled to be cautious and careful, and to consider the needs of our many you feel safe in doing so. And we encourmembers, and especially those most vulnerable to illness and respiratory complications.

In the midst of these many conversations, I continue to marvel at the creativity and passion of our church community. We continue to push forward in our ministries of justice, witness and compassion. This month's violence in American cities has renewed our purpose and conviction: that white privilege is a moral disease on the American body, and that we in the church must stand up and take new paths to heal and renew the country. And even in a time of physical distancing, your many friendships continue to inspire, sustain and encourage you in daily life. Though so many things about our daily lives have changed, our spiritual covenant is stronger than ever. And we are, together, united in our love for God, for one another, and for our broken and beautiful planet.

Working with the Church Council and our Ministry leaders too, I look forward to some new opportunities over the summer and into the fall. We'll take this very slowly; but we'll do some things we feel confident in doing safely. In the near term, this means occasional outdoor services, on the lawn in front of the Church Hill Apartments. Given the guidance we're getting from the Strafford County Public Health Network, we feel we can safely and wisely gather on an occasional Sunday morning, sitting in family groups at a safe distance, wearing our masks, but all the while enjoying one another and the Holy Spirit's blessing and courage.

We're planning the first of these for Sunday, July 12, at 9 am. (Beginning July 5, we move to our summer schedule of 9 am Sunday services). We trust you'll come if age you to wear masks, bring blankets and outdoor chairs of your own to sit in. There will not be coffee hour, or any refreshments following; but there will be a lively sense of community and all kinds of gratitude among us. For we miss one another! And we cherish every moment of our togetherness!

In the meantime, I look forward to your phone calls and messages. And I want you to know that you're very much in my daily prayers. As hard as this year has been, it only serves to remind me of the gift we have in one another, and the great power that is ours to change the world.

A TIMELY ONE-TO-ONE CAMPAIGN

As summer rolls in, church leaders are imagining new ways to connect us and encourage discernment around the huge challenges facing our communities, families and even our country. A service team is just coming together to consider a summer "one-to-one campaign"—a tool the church has used in the past to build deeper community and explore energies for ministry and action among us. What kind of power do we have—as a church—to make a difference in the fractured world? What's really possible in a community like ours: as we grieve racial injustice and fear for climate change, as we seek healing in a divided land? What might we be together? Can we make an impact?

In our Christian Scriptures, we find two words, two different Greek words, for "power." Exousia is authoritative power, power wielded from above, the power of a commanding officer, a policeman in the street, patriarchal power. Dunamis, on the other hand, is relational power, power generated by faith and respect, the power of alliances pursuing justice, the power of compassion and sacrifice, the power of God-in-us-together. This is the power (dynamic power) that Jesus embodies in ministry and invites fully and boldly in his followers. It grows in relationships built through conversation, collaboration and trust.

We imagine a "one-to-one" campaign that encourages conversation, curiosity and connection: rebuilding the changing and growing body of our church. How has this spring's upheaval affected you and those you love? What are your hopes for your community, your nation? What kinds of energy, anger, hope do you feel churning, developing within? In having these kinds of conversations, we will "lean into love and power," exploring the power that is ours together by faith. Relational power.

JUNETEENTH FLAG

Dear Friends of God,

Juneteenth is June 19. There is more than one Independence Day in America. On June 10, 1865, Union soldiers arrived in Galveston, Texas, to enforce the abolition of slavery. (Of course, the Emancipation Proclamation had been signed by Lincoln more than two and a half years before).

When freed slaves tried to celebrate the first anniversary, they were faced with a recurring problem: no public places permitted them to gather. In 1870, former slaves purchased 190 acres of land in Houston and named it Emancipation Park. Until the 1950s, it was the only public park and swimming area in the Houston area open to African Americans.



Also known as Freedom Day, Juneteenth is a state holiday in all but Hawaii, North Dakota, South Dakota and Montana; there is an active movement to make Juneteenth a federal holiday. Americans celebrate Juneteenth with parades, rodeo races, Miss Juneteenth contests and barbecues featuring soul food: fried chicken, barbecue, greens and black-eyed peas.

The Juneteenth flag depicts a "bursting new star" on the horizon, representing a new freedom, a new people, and a new start. Red, white, and blue colors communicate that the American slaves and their descendants are all Americans. With humility and commitment, we fly the flag at the church this month, a reminder of our commitment to that new start!

Free 4-week Learn Mindfulness Basics by Email – July 6-
