GOSPEL SEEDS

Action and contemplation now grow together into one life and one unity. They become two aspects of the same thing. Action is charity looking outward to other people, and contemplation is charity drawn inward to its own divine source.

Thomas Merton, No Man is an Island

In the four gospel stories, Jesus is constantly on the move. His courage inspires a movement. His gift for healing attracts large crowds. At one point, on the beach, they push him so hard, so desperately, that he asks his disciples to find a boat for him to teach from. Some breathing room. His heart aches for the suffering he sees, and Jesus weeps for the cruelty he meets in the streets.

I'm struck, in these stories, by Jesus' need for solitude, by his occasional retreats to quiet places for contemplation and prayer. He rarely stays for very long; but he's deliberate in withdrawing when he needs to: when conflicts overwhelm his spirit, when human need breaks his heart, when he needs simply to sit with God. Breathing room.

With so much heartbreak in our own lives, and conflict on so many fronts, we do well to meditate on the pattern of Jesus' life, the rhythm of it. Whether your life's work is raising teenagers or harvesting crops, whether your vocation is safeguarding waterways or organizing with immigrants, your energies are renewable, but precious and holy too. Be mindful of this. Be grateful for it. And look to Jesus, if you're so inclined, for encouragement and inspiration.

"Action and contemplation now grow together into one life and one unity." To move out in spirit and courage, Jesus looks within, meets God in simple breath and ordinary time. To build a movement and fight for justice, he takes time for prayer, meditation, solitary contemplation. It's all of a piece: not two different activities, but one life in faith.

As my ministry in Durham unfolds, even as it takes root this fall, I'm paying particular attention to my spiritual practice: a mix of meditation, prayer and reflection that grounds me each and every day. In the weeks to come, I look forward to sharing that practice with you, and to learning about your own practices, worked out in the unique circumstances of your own lives. What seems clear to me is that my ministry—with all of you, and with a wider circle of community partners and activists—draws life and depth from my own practice. Breathing room! In meditation and prayer, I'm reminded of the companionship of Christ and the humbling humor of the Spirit. And in just this way, I trust I can be of service to you, to God, and to the world.

At the heart of Christian practice is love. And not just any love, but *agape*: the robust and self-emptying love Jesus receives as pure gift and shares freely as his mission and purpose. Like the simple stunning act of breathing itself, faith receives love and gives it away. Inhaling, and then exhaling. Breathing in, and then

breathing out. Love and life received, love and life given away. As Thomas Merton says, action is love "looking outward" and contemplation is love "drawn inward." Isn't this the dynamic shape, the gospel energy of Christianity itself? Breathe!

I'm so delighted to be sowing these seeds with you, among you, for you. May these bright days of autumn thrill your heart, and set your spirits free!

NEIGHBORS IN NEED OCT 6TH

Neighbors in Need (NIN) is a special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. One-third of NIN funds support the Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM). Two-thirds of this offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries (JWM) to support a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects through grants. Neighbors in Need grants are awarded to UCC churches and organizations doing justice work in their communities. These grants fund projects whose work ranges from direct service to community organizing and advocacy to address systemic injustice. This year, special consideration will be given to projects focusing on serving our



immigrant neighbors and communities.

Most UCC congregations will receive the NIN offering on October 6, 2019 as part of their World Communion Sunday observance. However, some local churches select another date. NIN contributions can be made on-line at any time here.

Active Retirement Association Explores Hospital Mergers: Two Wentworth-Douglass Executives To Speak

How do hospital mergers impact your healthcare, and the health of the nation? The merger trend is here.

Come listen to Wentworth-Douglass CEO Greg Walker and VP Jeff Hughes talk about hospital mergers at an Active Retirement Association general meeting at 1:30 p.m. October 14 at the Durham Evangelical Church, 114 Dover Road, Durham, NH. It's open to the public, and refreshments will be served. Just bring your questions and comments.

Mr. Walker and Mr. Hughes will speak on hospital consolidation and Wentworth's relationship with Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston. They'll talk about "clinic collaboration," the idea of competing hospitals and the link with medical practices.

No doubt, they will address the now-stalled merger with Exeter Hospital, according to Dawn

Fernald, director of Marketing and Public Relations at Wentworth-Douglass Hospital.

Wentworth-Douglass and the Massachusetts General family are seeking a merger with Exeter Hospital. The state Attorney General's office opposes the move, citing the state's antitrust law and the Consumer Protection Act. The hospitals expect further talks.

The ARA, originally sparked by and affiliated with the University of New Hampshire, has grown to more than 300 members from Maine, New Hampshire and Massachusetts. Based in Durham, the ARA is committed to "Expanding Your World" by offering lectures, classes, discussion groups, films, cultural tours, walks/hikes, special-interest groups, and much more.
